I am honored to be the new executive director of the Eco-Justice Center. I've been serving as Eco-J's Program Manager and Developer since May and I was immediately drawn to its mission, land, animals, and staff.

I joined this organization with a unique background of programming and animal experience. My previous position was Senior Manager of Enrichment Programs for the Zoological Society of Milwaukee Education Department in which I oversaw programs for the public and school programs. During my 19 years at the Zoological Society, I developed curriculum, taught classes, created training

programs, maintained budgets, produced marketing pieces, and supervised staff & interns.

As executive director, I hope to expand both programming and reach in the community. Our Board is currently involved in strategic planning and I'm thrilled to join this process to help determine our future direction. Eco-J has a wonderful history, and the founding Racine Dominican Sisters as well as Sister Rejane Cytacki, the previous executive director, has given Eco-J a solid foundation from which to grow. Thank you to everyone who visited the new Eco-J Farm Stand!



The stand was open Fridays from mid-August to mid-October and sold produce grown by our Youth Farm Corps members. A big thanks to volunteers Margie Curtis & Nicole Reid for overseeing sales which totaled over \$1,600!

It's November at the farm and we are grateful for the abundance of food our gardens produced this past growing season. We harvested over 1,575 pounds of organically grown produce including several varieties of tomatoes and peppers, swiss chard, onions, winter squash, beets and more. One-third of our harvest was donated to the Northside Food Pantry.

With this beautiful fall weather we've been able to spend additional time amending our growing beds with leaves and compost as we put the garden to bed for the winter. Soon it will be time to start the cycle of seed to harvest once again.

There is comfort in the predictability of nurturing a seed to become a thriving plant. In this very uncertain and difficult time of the coronavirus, we, like many of you, have had to learn new ways to continue our work as we care for the earth and for each other. Thankfully, with the support of the Farm Corps crew and help from some very special people, the gardens continue to provide for us.

We're dedicated to finding new paths that allow us to continue to serve you and nourish our community. We are growing into who we need to be. Thank you to all who support us and share our vision.

In Animal News...



Everyone loves Halloween at the Eco-J! Here is Gaylord dressed as Al Paca-cino in Scarface.

Our alpacas will be starring in a video for Racine Unified School District first-graders as part of a virtual Growing Healthy program this spring. They will be helping the children learn about the parts of our digestive system and what is similar or different to an alpaca's digestive system.

For example, both humans and alpacas have a stomach, but alpacas have three parts to their stomach where we have only one. After food enters into their stomach, alpacas will bring some of it back up and chew it again. Aren't you glad we don't do that?!?

We now have a total of eight guinea fowl freeranging on the farm. Five of them hatched this summer. It is tricky to figure out if a guinea is a male or female. One way is by the different sounds the two sexes make. Females make a noise that sounds like. "buck-wheat, buck-wheat." Because of this we think we have seven males and just one female. As we learned during Eco-J Trivia Night, that's one confusion of guinea fowl!

With sad hearts we share that our beloved goat Olie passed away on November 4 after complications with a tumor and CAE, a terminal neurological condition. His exuberant and mischievous personality brought joy to many children, visitors, volunteers and staff over the years. Olie is survived by two female goats, April Rose and Patty Kay.

Both Patty Kay and April Rose were born in 2014 – Patty Kay was born on St. Patrick's Day and April Rose was born in April. They are taking the loss well and are getting extra attention from staff.
